CHURCH BUILDING TO BE CLOSED TEMPORARILY

I was informed this past week that the church building is not safe and poses a serious danger should something fall from the bell tower, front wall or choir loft. In consultation with Bishop McManus, I have decided that the church must be closed due to safety concerns. Beginning Monday, November 24th, all Masses, all Lord's Day Masses, weekday Masses, and funerals will be celebrated in the parish center. The façade and the front wall of the church appear to be moving due to buildup of ice and snow through the years, as well as the constant vibrations from the 290 interstate. The support beams for the church tower and steeple have extensive cracks and erosion. We have hired architects and structural engineers to begin a forensic investigation of the integrity of the front of the church building, the beams supporting the steeple and the stability of the choir loft. If economically feasible, we will attempt an interim repair to the church's front wall and steeple mounts. If not economically feasible, we will have to examine other options. It is entirely possible that we may not be able to return to using the church, especially if the cost to repair it, even temporarily, is prohibitive and beyond the parish's financial means. I believe that it is never wise to "throw good money after bad." I would appreciate your prayers especially during this time when we. as a parish, will have to make difficult decisions about our future.

SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

Rich king, poor king

At the height of church power in the Middle Ages, popes lived like princes ruling vast earthly domains. That changed in modern times with the rise of secular nations. After Italy united and claimed Rome as its capital in 1870, popes considered themselves "prisoners in the Vatican." In response to the loss of temporal power, the Feast of Christ the King was instituted to assert Christ's sovereignty. But Jesus made it clear his Kingdom is not of this world. In our own day, Pope Francis says he longs for a church that is poor. This is the kind of church presided over by Christ the King. Join his realm.

FEAST OF ANDREW DÜNG-LAC, PRIEST, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Big sacrifices pay off

How much are you willing to give? Some make the ultimate sacrifice and give their very lives. Andrew Dũng-Lac was a priest and one of 117 saints martyred in Vietnam during persecutions there in the 19th century. Three U.S. archbishops returning from Vietnam in 1989 said, "The church in Vietnam is alive and vigorous, blessed with strong and faithful bishops, dedicated religious, and courageous and committed laypeople . . . The church in Vietnam is living out the gospel in a difficult and complex situation with remarkable persistence and strength."

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 14:1-3, 4b-5; Luke 21:1-4 (503). ". . . those others have all made offerings from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has offered her whole livelihood."

FEAST OF CATHERINE OF ALEXANDRIA, VIRGIN, MARTYR

Healing saints

Saint Catherine of Alexandria is one of the Fourteen Holy Helpers, a group of saints who are venerated together because of their effective intercession against illness and who became popular during the Black Plague of the Middle Ages. Catherine, a virgin martyred—after one failed attempt—by a Roman emperor in the fourth century, is invoked against sudden death. Other saints in the group (and their patronage) include Blaise (illness of the throat), Barbara (fever), Elmo (intestinal ailments), and Denis (headaches). The intercession of these saints can be sought for comfort when sick.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 14:14-19; Luke 21:5-11 (504). "When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for such things must happen first, but it will not immediately be the end."

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 26

Gratitude is the best preparation

There are lots of things you can't prepare for in life. For good or ill, some things just happen. The way you respond, however, is a different story. In those cases, even when the unknown and unexpected befalls you, practice makes perfect. In those moments, the way you live your life takes control. If you live in gratitude, you will respond with gratitude; if you carry bitterness, you will respond in anger. Being in practice today can make all the difference tomorrow. It's then that you'll be called to demonstrate the faith that you strived to practice all along.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 15:1-4; Luke 21:12-19 (505). "Remember, you are not to prepare your defense beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking."

THANKSGIVING DAY

Simple gifts

If you've ever returned home from a hospital stay, particularly if the condition has been perilous or you have narrowly avoided a serious accident, you may have had the experience of suddenly seeing everything in a new way. Coming near to loss reveals how precious and unique are the things we take for granted. But we want to see this not only when threatened with loss. Rabbi Abraham Heschel said, "Just to be is a blessing. Just to live is holy." Beyond pilgrims and pumpkin pie, it humbles us today to realize such holiness, such blessing.

Power of the pen

Everyone these days is constantly bombarded with an overwhelming amount of written communications—email, texts, social media. There's so much of it, it's impossible to even absorb it all, and then it disappears into the digital ether. So it's hard to put much credence in any of it. But words do matter, and they have staying power. The Roman poet Horace wrote, "litera scripta manet"—the written word remains. Some words, God's Word, not only endure, they change the world—and continue to do so every day. Don't let those words get lost in the shuffle.

The promise is being fulfilled

The phrase "Maran atha!" appears only once in the New Testament; yet, for early Christians, it was the way they greeted one another. Meaning "the Lord is coming," Maran atha served as a hope-filled greeting and reminder under repressive Roman rule. Imagine greeting everyone you know with those words. What hope would spring forth? Navigating the day-to-day, you can forget the imminence of God. Sometimes it just takes the reminder of an encounter to renew hope in all Jesus promised and continues to promise. Jesus is coming—why not greet the world with the hope of that promise!
