Walking with Jesus: The Heart of Christian Life Paperback 'by Pope Francis Jesus is walking ahead of us. He is always before us. He goes ahead of us and leads the way. This is the source of our confidence and our joy: to be his disciples, to remain with him, to walk behind him, to follow him.' Pope Francis is acclaimed for the humble and simple faith that he has demonstrated in public and private. In this major new book he presents the heart of his approach to living as a Christian: following in the steps of Jesus. The book is divided into three parts: The Gospel of the Way, The Gifts of the Way, the Story of the Way. Francis has spoken and written widely on these themes during his first 18 months as Pope, and his thoughts are here collected for the first time, edited and abridged with full Vatican approval. Like his best-selling *The Church of Mercy*, this book is aimed at a broad readership of believers and non-believers, priests, religious, dedicated laypeople, and teachers.

Book Discussion: Tuesday, March 24 at 2:00 p.m. **Saint Padre Pio: In the Footsteps of Saint Francis by Michael J. Ruszala** In an age that smirks at the mention of miracles, sin, angels, and demons, St. Pio of Pietrelcina has emerged as a figure of immense popularity, attracting fascination, veneration, and also emulation. Padre Pio, who once wrote in a letter, “I am a mystery to myself,” is certainly a mystery to all who know of him. To those who moved beyond mere credulity, he became an inspiration to embrace the fullness of faith. Perhaps that is why his shrine in outlying San Giovanni Rotondo, Italy, is second only to the Vatican itself in annual number of pilgrims and why Italian Catholics now report to praying more for St. Pio’s intercession than for that of any other saint. This book is a concise introduction to Padre Pio’s life, especially as compared to the example and journey of his spiritual father, St. Francis of Assisi. If St. Francis is said to be the most popular saint of all time, Franciscan Capuchin Padre Pio is perhaps the most popular saint of our times. Given that he passed only in 1968, it is remarkable to think that such a spiritual “superhero” could exist in our modern age. Through not spared from misfortune, he was spared those things that cloud us from perceiving the world in a truly spiritual way. Perhaps that is why Padre Pio offers us just the message we need to hear. If anyone is interested in joining us for these Book Discussion or would simply like to read the books. Let me know and I can order a book for you. The cost of the books *Walking with Jesus* and *the Saint Padre Pio: In the Footsteps of Saint Francis* are \$10.60 (includes tax) each.

The ability to be a creator is one of God's greatest gifts to human beings. To make something out of nothing, something beautiful and meaningful, and share it, is uplifting. Think of all the religious art—music, painting, sculpture, architecture, literature—that was divinely inspired and helps people understand God better. But you don't have to be a Michelangelo to be creative and affect others. Making meals, scrapbooking family history, holiday decorating, finger painting with kids—there are countless ways to make art that expresses who you are and touches those you love.

FEAST OF SCHOLASTICA, VIRGIN, RELIGIOUS

Let the creativity flow

When creating something new, we don't know if it will make a lasting or meaningful difference in the world. Creation can be a profound act of faith, hope, and love. Saint Scholastica founded a monastery of Benedictine nuns in sixth-century Italy, seeking to grow in holiness and helping others do the same. Her act of creation reverberated through the ages, influencing the history of religious life and how we think about prayer. When you are drawn to create something new, something risky perhaps, remember Saint Scholastica—not only is she walking with you but so is our God who brings every good to fullness!

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 1:20-2:4a; Mark 7:1-13 (330). "So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested."

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES; WORLD DAY OF THE SICK

Heal and be healed

It's not easy to deal with significant health problems. Our faith can help us. We can draw strength through the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, by wearing a medal of the Archangel Raphael as a reminder of God's healing, or by praying with Our Lady of Lourdes, whose special patronage is those who are sick. Our parish family is also a source of support, with prayers of healing and practical assistance like rides to the doctor's office or help with meals. If you need a helping hand, have faith and don't be afraid to ask. If you're able to give a helping hand, faithfully extend it to others.

Faith shared, lives changed

Faith is something learned and given and, ultimately, shared. It's something you carry in your bones. You live it out in who you are and how you are and for that reason, you can share it without even realizing it. Think of the moments that you've encountered God's love in others; when someone shared the gospel with you through their love and forgiveness. God enters the world in those moments and changes lives. If you live out your faith today, there's no telling how far the gospel will reach. It can change the world—and you may not even realize it.

Show mercy

Abraham Maslow's hierarchy of needs is a theory in psychology that proposes that human beings must have their basic physical and emotional needs met before they can realize their fullest potential. Catholics are expected to help others satisfy those needs through the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy, which include feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, and visiting the sick as well as teaching those who lack education, forgiving offenses willingly, and comforting the afflicted. Through works of mercy the world gets closer to reaching its fullest potential. Let's all get to work!

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 14

FEAST OF CYRIL, MONK, AND METHODIUS, BISHOP

A genuine Valentine

This is real love: two brothers dedicate their lives to serving a people not their own. Born in ninth-century Greece, Methodius was older and eventually attained the office of archbishop. Cyril, more philosophical, was a linguist and theologian. Both took on the evangelizing of Moravia. There, Cyril devised the Slavic alphabet developed by later disciples and called Cyrillic in his honor. Both brothers fought for Bibles and liturgy in the language of the people. Pope John Paul II declared these brothers patron saints of Europe. Their love brought good news to strangers. Does yours?
